'Vicar's Thoughts' for March

Just a few days ago we enjoyed a really powerful Ash Wednesday Team service here at St Paul's, as we marked the start of Lent together. Roger Matthew's teaching was excellent. He reminded us that the three key secret things we do as Christians (fasting, giving and praying) are done in order to show God how dependent we are upon Him, and then also, the fruit of the Kingdom that grows within us when we engage in these disciplines, is then to be offered to the world. Discipline always bears fruit; whether that is practicing a musical instrument, immersing yourself in a foreign language or 'pushing-into God' with an intention to really seek Him. Nothing is ever wasted! But of course, there are many temptations to stop us growing in our spiritual maturity and therefore also stopping the work of the Kingdom through us.

We begin March's services looking at Jesus' time spent in the desert, immediately after His baptism. We see how satan was trying to thwart the inbreaking of God's kingdom in Jesus, and yet we see his inability to secure a victory over God-in-the-flesh. The desert wouldn't be the final time Jesus would face temptation: there was more to come as He followed the road to the cross. Yet at every point in His public ministry, Jesus relied on the truth of the Jewish scriptures and His vocation to be the 'Light of the World'.

So how do we follow the road to the cross? How do we battle temptation? It's not wrong to be tempted, but what spiritual weapons have we been given through faith, in order to resist it?

Firstly, as with Jesus, God's word is our weapon against temptation: a mighty weapon! And yet you'd be surprised how little people bother to use it. But if we feed off God's word, it not only nourishes our faith, but it comes back to our minds at times when the inevitable voices of temptation try to sidle up to us. We need to 'hear...read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest' the scriptures, as the Book of Common Prayer has reminded countless worshippers over the last few centuries. Being immersed in truth helps us to live it out!

Secondly, we need to keep focussed upon God. Yes, this is achieved through prayer and through Bible study, but also through Christian fellowship, regular worship and... (this next one can be really hard for us, with our human pride and desire not to appear 'weak') ... genuine accountability to each other. Part of belonging in Christian Community, is that we're honest with one another we should be "doing life" together, not hiding our weaknesses or pain from one another. How we need our Church family on the Christian road of faith!
